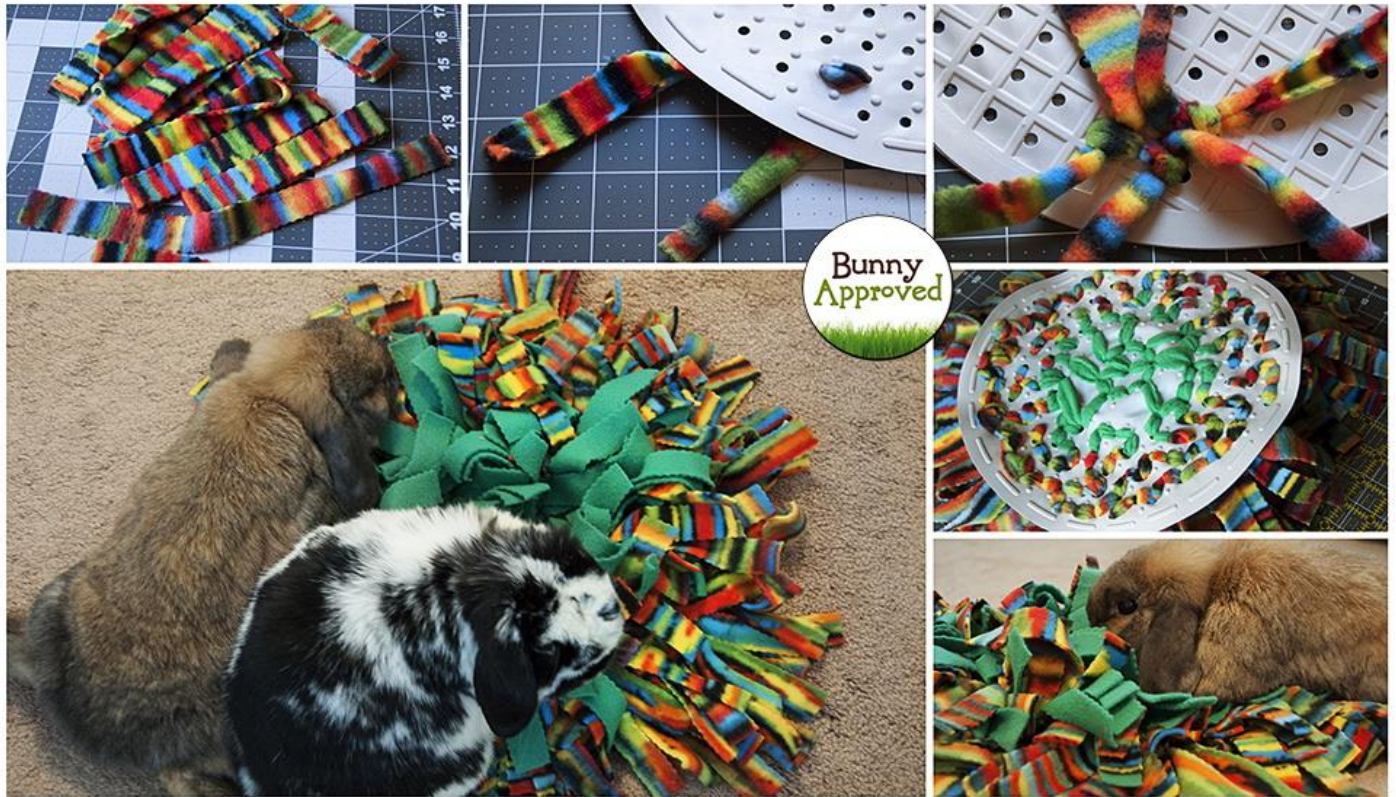


A fun and fluffy DIY toy for rabbits! Take a plastic or rubber mat with plenty of holes (sink mats work well) and a pile of fleece fabric strips (ours were 1" x 12"). Take one fleece strip, pull each end through a hole, and knot it off. Do the same with the other fleece strips - each hole gets used more than once. Now hide dry treats between the fleece and let your rabbit find them.

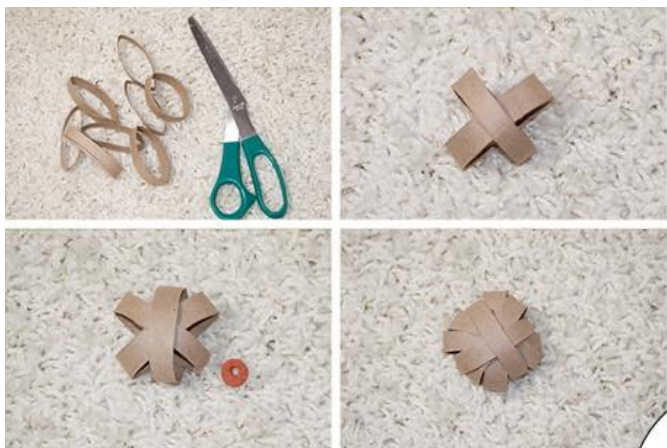
Use under supervision only. Take away if the rabbit eats the fabric or the mat.



For this toy, all you need is a bit of cardboard, scissors, some sisal or jute string, and strips of fabric (like this no-pill fleece). Cut the fabric and string long enough to be fun and short enough to not accidentally wrap around your rabbit's neck. Poke holes into the cardboard and pull the material through the holes with the help of the scissors. Make a knot on each side. Let your rabbit dig, pull, and chew!

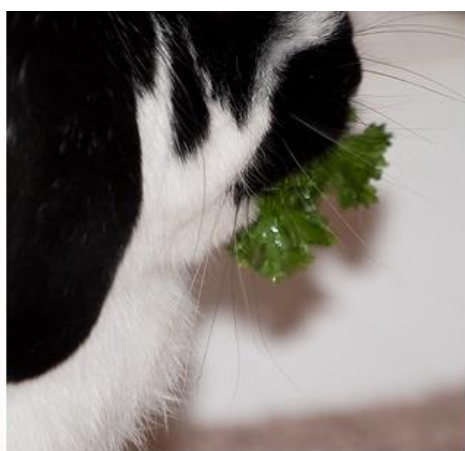

Take an empty toilet paper roll and cut it into even rings, about 0.5" wide each.

Place them inside each other criss-cross style to form a ball.

Add a favorite treat in the middle, such as a piece of banana, and let your rabbit figure out how to reach it! So fun to watch!

Works best when the treat has a strong smell to it.

For this game all you have to do is hang a slinky from a chair or table, so that it can swing freely and is within the rabbit's reach. Now add leafy greens or herbs to the slinky and let the rabbit play! The more you twist and loop the greens, the more challenging it will be.

Use under supervision only.



Purchase a few different wooden boxes with lids or drawers from your local craft store (\$1-4 each).

Use non-toxic glue (Elmer's, for example) and attach them to a flat wooden board, so they stay in place. If your rabbit is as particular as ours, add felt to the wooden board to create a non-slip surface.

Now add favorite treats/vegetables! We had to sit down and teach Bunny what to do, but now he's a pro!

This toy is both physically and mentally challenging for rabbits and also a lot of fun for them! Please use it under supervision only, especially if your wooden boxes were made with hinges or magnets.



For this toy collect a few toilet paper rolls, an empty tissue paper box, and some scissors. Simply cut the top off of the box, adjust the sides if necessary, and stuff it with paper rolls. The rolls should fit snugly, so they won't immediately fall out. Add some dry treats and enjoy!

Use under supervision only. If your rabbit eats the rolls or box, better take it away!

Blow up a small balloon and place it on a stand (like a cup or the lid of a candle). Take a roll of toilet paper, make a bunch of it wet, and plaster it all over the balloon. You are creating a bowl, so leave an opening on one side. After the initial paper is attached, it may be easier to wrap the paper around the balloon and then sprinkle water over it. Either way, you need a lot of toilet paper (maybe half a roll). Now let it dry. It takes about two days (after a few hours you can remove the balloon) and a hair-dryer might speed the whole thing up. Now put some hay in it and add a few of your rabbit's favorite dry treats as well. Your rabbit will love it! Because of its shape, the bowl is like a roly-polly toy and always stands back up. The paper is harmless if your rabbit tears it up, but if it outright eats it, better take it away. Have fun!



A quick and easy DIY toy for everybun! Find an old shipping box and remove the top flaps. Cut out two doors big enough for your bun to fit through. Now tear up a bunch of wrapping paper and place it inside the box. Your rabbit will have fun hiding, digging, and destroying the paper! You can also hide pieces of vegetables inside to make feeding time more fun.



Supervision recommended. If your bun eats the paper, better take it away!



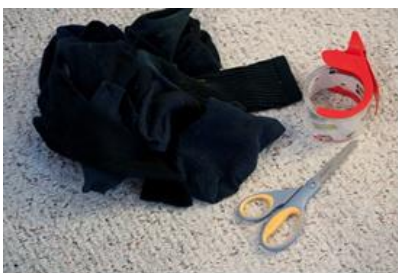
Flip the sides of a toilet paper roll in after adding your rabbit's favorite treat or hay.



Now wrap it up with some all natural jute or sisal string (available in craft stores) and let your bun figure it out!



Great way to wrap Christmas Gifts/Snacks!



For this toy simply find a cardboard box and a handful of old all cotton socks.

Cut a small entrance on two opposite sides of the box.



Now use your scissors or a carpet knife to poke holes in the top.

Place hay or a favorite treat into

the socks, cut a few small holes into them, and push them through the top of the cardboard box. They now hang on the inside of it.



Let your rabbit hop through the box and get the hay out of the socks!

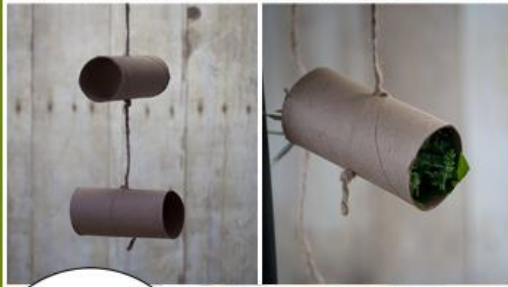
Please supervise your rabbit while using this toy. Take away if the sock gets eaten.

Another fun do-it-yourself project for those bunnies. All you need is 2-3 toilet paper rolls, some jute string, and a pair of scissors.

Cut a piece of string and tie a double-knot on one end. Make a small hole through the middle of the first paper roll and pull the string through. The bottom hole needs to be small so the roll won't fall off, but the top one can be bigger.

Tie another double-knot a little bit above the first roll and pull the string through the next paper roll.

Now you can fill it with lettuce and seal off the sides with some hay if you like. Hang it up and let your rabbit play!



Please don't leave any pets unattended with this toy.



Need a cheap and quick way to entertain your Bunny? Just throw a bunch of old newspaper or wrapping paper on the floor and let your rabbit play!

This works best in a corner or near a wall, so the paper stays in one pile.



A fun and easy way to entertain those bunnies! All you need is an empty cardboard container, such as the one pictured (sorry about the product placement), and some scissors.

Cut several holes into the container big enough for treats to fall out. Add your rabbit's favorite dry treat (we used chamomile flower buds) and firmly place the lid back on.

Now watch your Bun as he/she tries to get the treats out!

Use under supervision only. Make sure the lid doesn't get chewed/eaten.



Here is a fun way to interact with your bunny!

Get a couple of transparent plastic cups and place them upside down on the floor with your pet's favorite food in it.

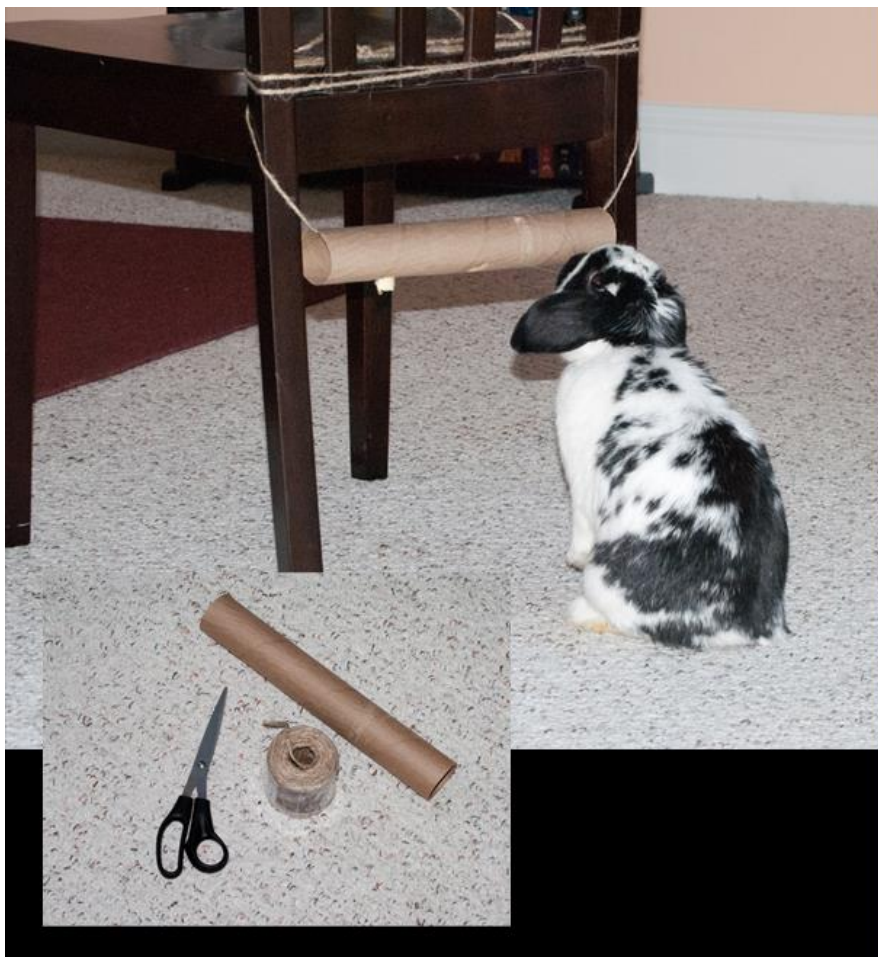
Only add a little bit to each cup to make the game last longer.

Now show off what you prepared! Encourage your pet to come over and get the food. But don't just leave now - stay and help him/her figure out how to get it and offer praise when it's accomplished!

Add more food to the cups and repeat. You can always make it more challenging by placing the cups on higher surfaces, too!

Make sure you never leave your pet unattended with the plastic cups and don't let him/her chew it.





Here goes a fun game: All you need is an old paper towel roll, some string, scissors, and vegetables.

Hang the paper towel roll somewhere - we used a dining room chair. Make sure it is within reach of your rabbit, but not so low that it becomes too easy.

Check the string to be sure it is securely fastened and your rabbit cannot get entangled in it. Supervise your rabbit while he/she plays with this toy.

Cut a bunch of small holes all around the roll and fill them with vegetables - parsnips, carrots, apples, and other firm vegetables are best. Let a small piece of the vegetables stick out.

Now sit back and let your rabbit figure out how to get the food out. Encouragement goes a long way! If it becomes too easy, you can always hang the roll higher up.



Why does food have to come in one bowl?

Try several small ones or use toilet paper rolls as pictured. Then place them all over the room/house (on top of, under, next to, and behind furniture) and let your rabbit search for his food!

Now feeding time becomes an interesting and entertaining event.

Have fun with obstacles! We all know rabbits love to jump, so why not turn it into a bonding activity!? You can make all kinds of simple obstacles, but this particular one requires 2 square dowels, 2 wooden squares for the feet, nails, at least one round dowel, at least two 1/4" cubes, and any decorations.



Then add a square to each dowel at the same height. Carve a little groove into the square to keep the round dowel in place.



Start by nailing each square dowel to one of the "feet".



Add the round dowel and tempt your bun over the obstacle with a treat!
